Hello, hello and welcome to the Feed U Podcast. I'm Alisa Conner and I'm your host and I am so grateful that you're here. Thanks for tuning in this week. We are hitting it hard talking about why you would need a landing page versus just an opt in form on your website to get people to sign up for your email list. And there's some specific reasons why you would need a landing page versus an opt in form. And I'm going to go through those. I have a total of six reasons and then I also have some tips for you at the end. If you don't happen to have a website of things that you can do to create that landing page without having a website, I don't recommend not having a website for long, but all the into that in just a little bit. So, um, the reason we're talking about landing pages is, you know, I don't talk about this very often and nearly enough, but one of the biggest ways to grow your business is to grow your email list. And so you, in order to do that, you need to have a place where people to land regardless of how you're promoting your business and opt in for information so you can gather their information and grow your list. And so a lot of the episodes that I talk about, um, we'll refer to, you know, creating content to drive that component. So you're promoting that content. But what we don't really talk about is what happens when they get to, um, your website or your landing page, wherever it's housed. And, uh, there's a couple options for that. I'll dig into those in just a minute, but really we need to get them somewhere so we can collect their name and their email address at minimum. So, um, we need to do that by creating either a landing page or an opt in form or, um, some sort of ability to, uh, collect that and then, um, store that in a database, which is typically by email service provider and continue to market to them. So eventually we can sell their products. And a lot of people start, um, at the beginning of this funnel. And really you need to be thinking about it from the end of the funnel and working backwards. Just so if you can think about that. So where do you want them to end up Wa and then what steps do they need to take to get to that result? Um, to that end point. So that's why there's a lot of failure with, um, you know, people when they're marketing online, specifically when our marketing and social media, cause they just create a bunch of posts. They stick it out there and, um, they soon become overwhelmed and overworked because they're constantly trying to, um, keep up with Facebook, keep with Facebook changes, keep up with Instagram and create posts for all of these different places. Hire people to create the

posts, but in the end, they're not leading anywhere. And so people get really frustrated by spending a lot of time on and money with social media when really they need to be looking at the end result first. So, um, whatever you're trying to get them, whatever product or service you're trying to get them to purchase back up from there. And um, one of the key components of that system is to create a landing page in your email, um, sequence. So before we get started and before I dig into those six different tips for why you would want to use a landing page versus an optin form, let's take a minute and hear from our sponsor.

So let's jump right in. I'm sure you're wondering, okay, Alisa, really what really is the difference between having a Landy painter and opt in for them? They both collect information. They both have the opportunity to connect to our email service provider and they both get us what we need, which is to grow our email lists. So why does it matter if I use a landing page or if I just use a forum? So I wanted, because that seems like such a simple question. Um, I really wanted to take an episode to explain some of the big differences of just sticking either an optin form on the front page of your website versus, you know, in the terms of conversion and actually getting people to sign up for that email us verse having versus having a dedicated landing page that is specifically set up to, um, invite people to join your

list for a specific reason. And that starts us off with number one. There is a very specific intent behind setting up a landing page. And when you have put a specific intent behind that landing page, um, it is clear to your visitors who come there and there are really three different intents. Number one is, is if it's a sales page, you're intending to sell them something, a product, a service, um, an event, whatever it might be. The intention is, and the intention should be, if it isn't to specifically have them take that one action. This is where I see a lot of people go wrong, is they set up a page or they set up a form, an opt in form in the middle of their website, and they're trying to sell a product or service. Well, the human brain doesn't, does not focus well. We need to assist it whenever we can. And when you have your opt in form in the middle of a really busy say homepage and there's all these other things that can take their attention. For example, uh, your blog, they might have intended to go there and sign up for your whatever Freebie or offering, but then they see, oh, there's an article right here that I see dancing across the screen. That's their newest blog article. I'm going to go read that. Well then if there isn't a call to action at the end of that blog article that sends them directly to what they came up, came there to sign up. Four you've lost them likely is they're going to read the blog or article. They're either going to share it or they're going to close the window and go back to what they were doing. So giving them a specific call to action is specific intent of going to that page. And then sticking with that specific intent will actually increase your conversion rate. So number one is to actually sell them something. And you know, you've done a lot of work up to here. You don't want to just send people from say, um, I don't know, a Facebook live that you've met them one time or an event that you met them one time to a sales page. You've got to do a little bit work of work and build that relationship a little bit. Does that mean you shouldn't sell to them right away? You can give them the opportunity. However, I'm recommending that you probably want to build a relationship just a little bit more because you're gonna have a higher conversion rate. That's kind of the point. Um, the second intent that you might have is that you actually want to add them to your email list and there is a specific, um, Freebie or you know, like right now I have a challenge going, so there's a specific reason that they're getting added to the list and you have promoted that reason. Um, and that could be, you know, you're offering them a free download to help them with a, B, and c, you're offering them a coupon for 20% off when they first visit your establishment, your restaurant, hair salon, whatever that may be. Um, there's a specific reason that they're going there to get that. And if you make it very clear that this is the only thing on this page, there's nothing else to distract you.

They're going to know name, email or sometimes text marketing works the same way. So it could be text, um, cell phone number and name and they opt in and then they get what, you know, get what they came there for. And then the third reason would be that you may want to collect some additional information. And so for example, I have seen this happen with different software providers and they may have a simple opt in form on the front part of their website that is a for a download which could, which can get lost. But then they have an extended form that if you want to do a free trial of their software, there are some things that they need to know. And what they're doing is there, they're data mining, that's what [inaudible] is what this is called. They're trying to collect as much data upfront from the person wanting to do the free trial as they can in order to be able to contact them and pursue the sale. And so what you may see is that, you know, an in form may just be a name and an email, whereas I'm an extended data mining form would be your name, your title, your company, your phone number, uh, your email address and maybe even a credit card authorization because you're signing up for a free 30 day trial and they're requiring a credit card because if you don't cancel it, they're going to bill you. And so you could see that asking for all of that on the homepage. One is a very large farm and it could take up a lot of space. And so instead you may want to offer it in the, um, the fashion of either a pop up form or having a completely separate page. And I've seen both done. Um, I think a pop up form is probably, I would like that a little less because I think if you actually send them to a specific page where they fill out the information, um, it's less distracting. There's less distractions there and people are distracted constantly. I mean, you get, uh, alerts on your computer or alerts on your phone. You get, uh, notifications, all this sort of stuff. So the more you can create marketing and specifically email marketing and data collection, simple and specific, and um, distraction free, the better off you're going to be in, the higher conversion you're going to have. So number one is specific intent. Number two, I just touched on this, but you want to create a distraction free zone. So that means if somebody is coming to your landing page, the intent is to get them to fill out that form. That's it. You don't want them to do anything else. You don't want to add your menu. You don't want to have a link to some other product or service. You don't want to have 'em, you know, here's my latest blog posts. You want them to fill out that form. Now when they have filled out the form, there is a confirmation that typically pops up. That is where you can put that additional information. Hey, by the way, we see you're interested in this. Did you know we have open enrollment for blank right now? Um, or did you know that we

were offering a free coupon for this? Or did you know, um, that we have a free Facebook group? That kind of stuff. So, but the intention behind a single landing page is that you are getting them there to do a specific task, give you their name and give you their email address. And the less confusing you can make it, the less information you put on there other than what they really need to know is they've arrived in the right place. This is what you're promising them. Here's the information I need in order to send that to you. Um, you don't want to just have a form. Obviously you want it to have a little bit of information so that they know they've come to the right place. Um, they're reaffirmed into what they're getting, all of that sort of stuff. But that's it. You don't want to distract them with anything else. You can distract them and send them to learn more about you after they filled out the form. The third reason you want a landing page or this is an opt in form, is that it makes it really easy for you to track whether or not people have converted. Now there's a lot of different analytics available and some are more reliable than others. But when you had a specific landing page set up on your website and it leads to a specific thank you page, once they have completed the form, it is much easier to track the exact conversions of that page because you can look at the page and see how many website visitors went there. And then you can go to the thank you page and see how many people, um, actually reached that thank you page. And then the third reference point is actually looking at your, um, your opt in form creator. In my case, I use, um, bloom and see if the numbers match for the number of forms completed and the number of people that went to the thank you page. So what I'm saying with all of that going on is that you can look at your metrics and make sure one that it's working and that too, you're actually getting signups and um, that you're getting the completed form and if something is awry and you, your website is showing all these forms are completed and then you go over to your email service provider and there's no people subscribed, something is broken and so you need to make sure you go in and fix that. But it's much easier to know when you have a landing page versus an opt in form, whether or not you can measure whether or not that's working and where the breakdown is. So not that you can't do it with an opt in form, but I think I'm with a landing page is specifically if you are running a Facebook ad, you need to stick the Facebook on that specific page. So, um, you know, whether or not it's converting because you don't want to pay for traffic if it isn't in some way converting through your sales funnel. Number four is that you can get new people to your website. And this kind of goes back to the point I just made, whether you're paying for that traffic to come or you're sending it organically, but you can get more people to your site and you

can give them an introduction or a taste of who you are and what you do and add them, um, to your list while they're there. So you can give them a taste of, so maybe let's use the example of you have a new blog post and you're giving them steps one through three of a seven step process. And they read that and then they get to the end and they're like, well, if you want steps four through seven or the complete guide, you can fill out this form and then have that open up. And I always have that go to a separate page. You could do it either way with a form or with a page. But I prefer the page. Again, same reason you're wanting, then you're running to get their attention. And so when you have their attention and that window opens, there is no distractions that are like, you know, you can have another headline, Hey, do you want the whole guide? We, you know, um, one through three or grade at four through seven are even better. Give her, you know, just fill out your name and email below and we'll get it over to you in the next five minutes or whatever, you know, whatever you want to say. Um, but they are there and then you know, you can redirect them again. Uh, the fifth reason is that you can, um, add more SEO and search benefits through your landing page. It gives you one more page for search and you can use specific keywords and SEO terms on that landing page that I will pull up in Google. And when you can do that, you can't do that in a form because it won't search or form. However it will search a page. And so it by it, I mean Google, Google can search a page but it cannot search a form. And so when you have that extra page set up, if you're really strategic about, you know, the description that you use and um, if you have even, um, the ability to share that page. There's a, I talked about this, I think I talked about this last week, but I get confused sometimes if I talk about it in the podcast or if I talk about it in the Facebook group. But you want to add sharing software in at the bottom of that page that people can share that page with other people if they get value out of it. And that will also give you even more because Google likes interaction. They like when things are shared, they like when new content is added, they like to see SEO terms in there. Um, and they like to see more and more visits. So when you have a lot of visits to that page, they're going to promote that in the search rankings and um, you will see more traction and more, um, interaction on that page. And then you can also, um, ensure that that landing page is content specific. So Google really likes when your URL is specific to the content on that page. And sometimes if you have a homepage, you may have two or three different sections of information, whereas if you have a landing page, they are going to that page for a very specific reason. They are going to get a download on blank subject and let's say dog walking, they're going to this page because they want your free

dog walking, um, video that is related to how to walk an older dog that has leash problems that has been trained wrong. And so if you have information in, in on that page describing, um, you know, here's all of the problems we see with older dogs that have been trained wrong, but don't worry, they can't be trained just to opt in here and we're going to send you our free video. And so all of that, you know, all of the keywords you could stick in there. And then if your URL is dog walker.com, forward slash walking older dogs, that's, you know, it the URL matches the content versus you know, you may have a, a most of your pages are going to contain multiple subjects and um, infer, you know, pieces of information and so they're not as specific. Google has a propensity to like really specific URLs that match the content on the page. So another good benefit. And then last but not least, we talked about this a little bit, but it's easier to track your ad effectiveness. Um, and that goes for the Facebook pixel, the Google Pixel, and you can really track if what Google is saying and Facebook are saying our conversions versus what is really happening. And there are several measurements. I don't want to get into it too much because it's kind of confusing to walk through all of those components without looking at it visually. But, um, that may be something that I tackle in the Facebook group. If you haven't joined the Facebook group, I would love to see you over. There is a, there's a link in the show notes for you to come over and check that out. But it's small business builders, all one word on Facebook and I do lots of little trainings in there and uh, talk about a lot of things that I talk about in here in a little bit more in depth. And I also try to do some actual visual video training on things and I'm increasing that as we go. So if you haven't joined, go join, it's free and I would love to see over there, but back to being able to track, uh, the effectiveness of your, of your ad. Again, you with those separate pages set up and the, um, connection of the Facebook pixel to whatever piece of the puzzle you're trying to track, you can actually make sure that what they're billing you for is actually happening. So if you have Facebook saying, yeah, we've had 500 people fill out this form and then you go over to your website analytics and realize it's 50 people, then you can say, I'm not, you know, I don't know if you, I don't know if you can go back and say I'm not paying you for those, but you can actually, you have the statistics to show them that, you know, my website is only showing this many. So if something is broken, please, you know, let's figure out what it is. So that's the six. They, they actually are pretty quick, pretty easy. But I also wanted to talk to you, um, in this episode about, you know what, if you don't have a website, there are some people that are brand new to business or they have a website but it's super old and it's not functional and it's not supporting their business,

but they don't want to invest in a website right now. So I wanted to give you some options. Um, because you, in my opinion, building your list, it should be the number one priority in your business that in selling things, because if you have an email list, you can create a website later, you can create social media profiles later. You can do all of that later. However, building your list is going to give you the opportunity to have people to tell when you do all of those things. And so building and nurturing your email list is really, really important. Um, so what happens if you don't have a website or your website isn't working? Well, I wanted to give you a couple options. So first is, is if you have an email service provider like convert kit, they offer you the opportunity to just set up a landing page and there are some benefits to this. And there's also some downsides to this. Um, the benefit is, is that most of those email service providers like ConvertKit, drip, MailChimp, all of those that have those, um, specialized landing pages that are part of the application, uh, they have templates and you, so you can easily go in and build an email and you know, get your information in there and set up, you know, your actual page where people would go, add your content, add your fields that you want them to fill out and have it up and running relatively quickly, probably within five minutes. However, where the limitation comes in is that you cannot customize the thank you page. Um, you might be able to customize the thank you message a little bit, but typically you can't add a link. You can't send your subscriber to, um, learn more about you cause there is nowhere to send them if you don't have a website. And so using those landing pages and they had a benefit it quick, easy, set it up and get ready to go. Um, most of them will allow you to add images and video, which is really important if you're setting up either a landing page or sending an email. Um, because you want people to get to know you, especially since there is no ability for them to click on another link and go to your about me page or your homepage or your contact page. Um, and so when you're building that, you want to add as much of your personality and your, um, well your personality and who you are into that form. You in most instances can customize your colors and you can customize your form information. What I have found is most of them do not let you add your own fonts into their landing pages. They have a limited number of fonts. So if you're wanting to keep your branding on par and have everything match, you're going to have a hard time with that. Most of them will not do that. Uh, there are some other options I'm going to talk about in a minute that, you know, we'll give you a little bit more freedom. But for the most part, um, when you're using those built in landing pages and forums in one of the email service providers, they're pretty limited. Uh, you can

in most cases connect them to some sort of analytics, whether it's Google or Facebook. Um, and then there's another service out there that's called segment. I just happened to fall upon it when I was doing some research for this episode. I don't know a lot about it, but apparently it is another analytics component that allows you to track, you know, how many people have filled out the form, how many people have, um, visited the page and not filled out the form, all that sort of stuff so that you have an idea. So there are some pitfalls to this and um, I talked about a few of those, but number one is you can't have a thank you page in any of these, um, email service provider options for a landing page. A, you can't direct them to other website content. The subscriber cannot learn more about you. There's no central hub for you to store content. Um, and you could be seen as not really being quote in business or as a real company. And so those are some of the downfalls. Now the other option that's out there, and I had to use them in the past, there is a fee associated with this one. Um, in addition to your email service provider and that is lead pages. Now lead pages does offer you the opportunity to set up a landing page as well as a thank you page, um, that are, that looked like real pages. So you would actually have a landing page where they could go and you know, learn all about what they need to learn about for whatever reason you're giving them to opt in, challenge, download, um, pdf, whatever it is, training event, and then you can actually create a separate thank you page. They have templates, um, and they integrate with pretty much every type of email service provider out there. I can't think of one off the top of my head that they didn't integrate with. It does take a little bit more, little bit more knowledge to get that set up. Um, but they do have the ability to create a very personalized experience so you can change all your fonts, your colors, your background images, um, and all of that stuff so that it matches whatever brand you're trying to put out there and ha, it doesn't look like people are going to a separate site. You can track for Facebook and um, Google and you know, put those pixels in there. However, again, you're not gaining any traction for your brand because it's their URL, not yours. And so people aren't going to be seeing those forms unless you're out promoting them specifically. In other words, if they do a Google search to try and find your five day challenge, it's not going to show up because it's part of lead pages and it's not part of your website versus if you had that landing page or that option. Well, specifically that landing page on your website, uh, that could show up in Google and promote your website. So that's what I've got for you today. The six reasons that you should be using a landing page versus an often forum. Not that opt in forms are bad, but specifically the reason that we would like to see landing pages used and also a five

things to do if you don't have a website to get started to grow your email list. So that's what I have for you this week.
